





## Changes in Thinking

### 2002

Only 42% understood that infants can communicate before they learn to speak.

Public unsure whether babies' cries were 'conscious manipulation' or expressions of genuine need.

### 2011

96% understood that infants can communicate before they learn to speak.

85% understood that for infants, cries and signals indicate a genuine need for adult attention.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 155-Relative to childhood brain development.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 155, as introduced, Bocanegra. Childhood brain development: adverse experiences: toxic stress.

This measure would urge the Governor to identify evidence-based solutions to reduce children's exposure to adverse childhood experiences, address the impacts of those experiences, and invest in preventive health care and mental health and wellness interventions.




Exhibit A: A story for social change

### What cultural models are activated by this message?

Is there any conversation about reforming CEQA in Sacramento? None. Any chance of reforming Proposition 13? Very little. The only discussion to date involves the so-called "split-roll" that would raise commercial rates while leaving Proposition 13's limits on residential property taxes untouched. This will only make the local government bias against residential real estate worse. And so, California families continue to face a very real housing crisis. The state leaders, meanwhile, are not helping. It's the cruelest irony; we have a housing crisis, and California's leaders are not addressing it. They're merely professing to help with costly policy gimmicks that are no substitute for freeing the market to align supply with demand.


### What cultural models are activated by this message?

Taking good care of yourself and your family is important. You try to eat healthy foods. You see your health care provider for checkups. You try to protect your family from accidents and illness. You want to live in a safe neighborhood and home. There is a direct relationship between your home and your health. A healthy home can reduce or prevent some health problems. A house, apartment, or building should be maintained to support the health of its residents.

### What cultural models are activated by this message?

A bold attempt to begin to create a mini-neighborhood on scraps of unused land just off the 10-land Wakota Bridge has been dealt a setback. The Metropolitan Council's thumbs-down response to a request for nearly \$1 million in subsidies means the whole effort in Newport will now likely have to wait for another year, officials say. Affordable housing, especially when it's within walking distance of transit, is a major emphasis for the Met Council these days. And the Newport project would have involved just that—scores of affordable units right across the street from a transit station that opened in December.







Imagine that you're introducing yourself at a social gathering.


Set up your work with Interdependence, using the Value before mentioning particulars. Example: I'm Nancy, and my work makes sure that all of the talents and energy of San Mateo County are <u>available to strengthen our communities</u> no matter where they live. I run a program that <u>keeps everyone connected</u> by making sure quality housing is available to all.

Use your Reframe Card to put in as strong a "dose" of the Value as you can manage.






Only about a quarter of resources for housing from the government go to households who make less than \$40,000 a year. This means that people with lower incomes have to spend more of their money on housing, which puts them at a disadvantage in other areas of life by having less to spend on things like health and education. What this means is that we are giving the least help to those who need it most. We must change this and use our resources so that everyone can afford a decent place to live.



### Poor housing affects education outcomes

#### Cause

Quality housing is increasingly unaffordable; families are forced to live in unhealthy conditions.



#### Consequence

Our children's test scores, achievement levels, and graduation rates are lower than they should be.

## Building an Explanatory Chain

Problem	Poor housing negatively affects children's education outcomes.
Cause	Quality housing options are increasingly unaffordable, so more families are having to live in unhealthy conditions.
Link	Poor housing conditions expose residents to contaminated air.
Link	Children exposed to contaminated air are more likely to develop asthma or other lung conditions.
Link	Children with asthma have more sick days and school absences.
Consequence	Missed schooling negatively impacts education outcomes, like test scores, achievement levels, and graduation rates.
Solution	We need inclusive housing policies that temper rising costs and focus on illness prevention. Frequent, mandatory health inspections would support education and wellbeing for people at all income levels.




